Brief: This is a brief summary of the life of my grandfather, Zalman On (Unreich), who lived from 1912 to 1978. Growing up I heard bits and pieces of stories about him and his heroism in helping to found the state of Israel, but the details were previously shrouded in mystery. After many months of research, and with the amazing power of the internet, I have pieced together a detailed biography based on interviews, written stories, photos, letters, and some vintage historical film, learning a lot about this incredible hero. Zalman has always been a mystery - no one knows where he came from or what his next move might be; one moment he appeared to enter a room and next nobody seemed to know where he went. Like a real life "James Bond" - there is a Hebrew word used to describe Zalman, pronounced "al-mo-nim" (אלמונים), which means "undercover" or "anonymous" or "nameless." He has never been recognized for much of the amazing deeds he undertook – until now.

Biographical Note:

Zalman On (Unreich) (September 21, 1912 – April 21, 1978) was a nameless hero by recorded history, and his whereabouts were often unknown. He died at the relatively young age of 66. These are his untold stories and the events surrounding this unsung hero of "Eretz Yisrael." Remarkably, Zalman was best known as an exceptional athlete, as a champion medalist in freestyle and Greco Roman wrestling, but he was so much more: a fierce protector of the Jewish community, an immigrant, founder of a youth Zionist movement and a member of Israeli intelligence organizations, a diplomat, Statesmen, rescuer of Jews and more. Zalman contributed in many ways during two historical periods: the pre-State Jewish community in Palestine and post-State of Israel in and after 1948.

Zalman was born in Bratslavia, Czechoslovakia (now Slovkia), to parents Regina Rakhel (Rachel) and Rabbi Sulim (Shalom) Jonas Unreich and he was one of eight children. Before World War II, in his youth, Zalman lived in Czechoslovakia. His family was extremely athletic. Indeed, his older brother, David Unreich, was a world-famous wrestler in the 1930s, and Zalman himself was also recognized as a star wrestler. He competed against champion wrestling athletes at the time, including the person who later founded the martial arts called Krav Maga. As time went on, however, he and his family experienced significant Anti-Semitism. The experience of dealing with this Anti-Semitism laid the foundation for his extraordinary story. Sadly, his parents and oldest sister ultimately perished in Auschwitz during the Holocaust. His remaining siblings fled Europe and immigrated to various other countries. He and a few of his brothers immigrated to Palestine in 1933.

In Palestine, Zalman played an instrumental role in the creation of the State of Israel and took part in various high-profile events. Beginning with serving in the Notrim, the Jewish Police Force prestate Israel and later joined the Haganah, known as the Jewish paramilitary organization during the British Mandate. Later he served in several leadership roles in the Histadrut, and after the founding of the state of Israel, he served his country as diplomat and director of security, eventually working for a so-called Independent Tourism Agency at what's known today as the Ben Gurion International Airport. In Palestine, Zalman met and eventually married (Tova Gertrude Sussman) and together they had a son and two daughters.

When you read about the personalities involved in the founding of the state of Israel, such as David Ben-Gurion, Moshe Sharett, and Golda Meir, you will hear no mention of Zalman, but he was an

influential member of this esteemed group. He participated in secret missions while with foreign dignitaries like Jan Masaryk, who is known as a key Czechoslovakian diplomat and politician. He had close relationships with master spies, like Reuven Shiloah, founder of the Mossad Israeli Secret Service Intelligence Agency and Eli Cohen. Zalman played a key role during the Israel arms negotiations with Czechoslovakia, finding the paratrooper Haviva Reik remains, rescuing Jews and later was a recognized diplomat, welcoming foreign dignitaries and diplomats at the Histadrut Tourist & Travel office. Zalman influenced so many and his interests remained diverse. He was philanthropic and helped to start youth sports organizations in Israel, acknowledged for saving holy Jewish artifacts and he even had a friendship with one of the most iconic musical artists of all time, Frank Sinatra.

Scope and Content:

Zalman's collection contains photos, correspondence, letters, newspaper clippings, and historical films. Spanning multiple languages, such as English, Hebrew, German, Yiddish, Hungarian, Czech and Latin. The artifact collection includes approximately 180 photos, 40 correspondence, 10 newspaper articles, 20 documents, 5 media (films or audio) and over 60 named social connections. We have about 60 chronological noted events (i.e. event dates, descriptions, places and sources) and still counting of Zalman, spanning two historical periods: the pre-State Jewish community in Palestine and post-State of Israel in and after 1948.
